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

The Arizona Office of Tourism (AOT) provided special cooperative marketing funding, enabling rural non-profit tourism entities to promote their communities.



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



Roads Less Traveled


It's hard to imagine a place more perfectly designed for road trips than Arizona.

This is a big old state, the sixth largest in the union, covering nearly 114,000 square miles. Since most of Arizona's population centers are found in clustered bunches, that leaves vast tracts of scenic backcountry. It's sprinkled with just the right number of small towns to add character and to keep travelers gassed up and well fed.

For more than four decades I've rambled around this astonishing state. At first it was just for fun because I was swoony in love with everything I saw. But for the past couple of decades it's been my job as an Arizona travel writer and author. So when I steer you toward a two-lane back road worth exploring, trust me. I know what I'm talking about. Here's one of my favorites.

Patagonia-Sonoita Scenic Road

I like to surprise people with this drive. Pastoral grasslands, vineyards, and hidden lakes are among the last things most people expect to find in Southern Arizona, just miles from the Mexican border.



The road starts in sure-enough desert, leaving Interstate-10 at Exit 281 about 20 miles east of Tucson. Head south on Arizona 83 amid cactus and mesquite scrubland. After climbing through a rugged canyon the road bends southeast to cross a virtual sea of grass.

Sprinkled with oak trees and lightly carved by stream channels, this is part of the vast Sonoita Plain. It's a delicious horizon-stretching expanse of soft rolling hills that seems to go on forever.

Champagne-colored grasses sway at the touch of every breeze. Mountains that once dominated are shoved back by this unexpected savanna. This is a land built for covered wagons and bison herds. These are wide-open spaces where the Old West still lives and breathes. If God has a lawn, this is it.

For an exquisite glimpse into the past, stop by **Empire Ranch**, dating back to the 1870s. Take a tour of ranch headquarters or stroll through the cottonwood trees shading the wash and try to guess how many movies have been filmed here. Hint: It's a lot.

Sonoita straddles the junction of Arizona 83 and Arizona 82, looking more crossroads than town. Yet this is the cradle of Arizona's wine

industry, where it all began. Several vineyards and wine tasting rooms dot the hills, most in Elgin, 9 miles east. So belly up to the bar and order a shot of merlot with overtones of plum and oak, pilgrim.

About a dozen miles southwest of Sonoita on Arizona 82, **Patagonia** nestles in a long green valley. Shops, galleries and eateries surround the big community park that anchors downtown. The picturesque setting makes Patagonia a beloved destination for road trippers. The tree-lined hamlet is known as an arts community, a haven for birders, and a hotspot for butterflies - possibly the most charming triple threat ever.

Grab a bite at Velvet Elvis in downtown Patagonia where designer pizzas are built using a savory whole-wheat crust as a platform, sturdy but light and perfectly charred, with an eclectic but beautifully balanced blend of toppings (292 Naugle Ave., 520-394-2102, velvetelvispizza.com).

A few miles south of Patagonia is the turnoff for **Patagonia Lake State Park**. Tucked away amid rolling hills, the 250-acre lake offers boating, fishing, water skiing, camping, and a sandy swimming beach. Boat rentals are available. The park also provides access to the **Sonoita Creek Natural Area** with over 20 miles of hiking trails.



A few more miles crossing grassy ridges, skirting small canyons with nice views of the Patagonia Mountains and the road ends in **Nogales**. This is the largest border city in Arizona. If you're hungry, step into Cocina La Ley and you'll feel like you wandered a few blocks south and are dining across the border. Soups and tacos make up the menu, an excellent (continues on page 16)

variety of each. The spicy seafood broth is a house favorite (226 W. 3rd St., 520-287-4555, cocinalaley.com).

You can return the way you came because there's plenty to see all over again. The other option is to travel north to Tucson via Interstate 19 from Nogales. Now I'm a firm believer in the mathematical theorem: the fewer the lanes of highway, the greater the chance for adventure. So I don't normally advocate interstates as part of the travel experience. But there are so many attractions, both scenic and historic, spread along I-19 that it's worth the journey.

Here's another fun fact: I-19 connecting Tucson and Mexico is America's only metric interstate. Distances are posted in meters and kilometers.

Stops worth considering along I-19 include **Tumacacori National Historical Park**, protecting the remains of a mission established by Father Eusebio Francisco Kino in 1691. The grounds feature a weathered sunlit church, mortuary chapel and cemetery.

Nearby **Tubac** sprang up as a presidio, or fort, in 1752 making it the first European settlement in what would become Arizona. Today, 80-plus shops are clustered around a central plaza in Tubac, a beloved artist


haven. There's a whiff of emergent Santa Fe here without the jostling crowds. Tubac doesn't even have a traffic light and it's easy while exploring the district to fall into a relaxed and carefree rhythm. And isn't that what travel is all about?







Sierra Vista is a fast growing modern community, just to the east of Fort Huachuca, an active historic Army base.





Take a Historic Highway 80 Road Trip Through Cochise County

US Route 80, the "Broadway of America", was а major transcontinental highway opened in Arizona BROADWAY back in November, AMERICA 1926. It served

the major cities of Phoenix and Tucson. US 80 followed the old Spanish Gila Trail, the main southern wagon train route to California. In

that

2018, surviving segments were designated Historic US Route 80. The 72 mile drive from Benson (exit 303 off I-10) down to Douglas at the border makes for a fine day trip by car or RV.

Early roads used "Macadam" pavement, invented by John

McAdam of Scotland in the 18th century. McAdam's road cross-section was composed of a compacted subgrade of crushed granite covered by a surface of light stone to prevent damage from wagon wheels and

to shed water to roadside drainage ditches. When automobiles started using these roads after the turn of the 20th century, vehicle speeds created a vacuum, pulling vast amounts of dust into the air. To remedy the dust problem, the road builders covered the

Macadam with asphalt or tar, giving the new surface the name "Tarmac."

As automobiles became more popular, people wanted to take trips in their new cars, creating a heavy demand for more new paved roads. Roadside towns added gasoline filling stations, roadside restaurants and other businesses. Folks also needed a place to stay for the night, which led to the birth of the "Motor Hotel" - or, as it is known today, the Motel. Here in Cochise County, US 80 greatly increased commerce between Benson,

Tombstone, Bisbee, and Douglas - four historic cities that you'll visit on your trip today.

Most of original Highway 80 still exists. From Benson to Tombstone, new SR 80 follows the same path as it did in 1926, with a few changes. You can still see the old bridges several hundred feet to the west. From Tombstone to Bisbee, the highway is almost the same as the old US 80. It still comes up Mule Canyon to

> Bisbee, although they added Mule Tunnel in 1956 instead of going over the original Mule Pass. And guess what - at the top of the grade, just before the tunnel entrance, you are driving over the Continental Divide! Old Highway 80 then proceeded down Tombstone Canyon through present-day Bisbee, south

through Lowell, then veered east to Douglas. The road has been re-aligned slightly between Bisbee and Douglas to straighten out the curves, meeting today's safety standards. In Douglas it went

down G Avenue to the Gadsden Hotel, where it then turned east on 10th Street before turning to head northeast another 48 miles, crossing into New Mexico at Rodeo on the way to Lordsburg.




WILLCOX WINE FESTIVALS



Today, those primarily dependent on social security income can't afford to pay \$1500+ in the States for a crown. The same is true for many Canadian winter travelers in Arizona.

As publisher of the AZ State RV Travel Guide, representing the RV industry and other Arizona community resource guides, I understand the "medical tourism" interest, especially by mature adults on fixed incomes. Fortunately, Agua Prieta (A.P.), Sonora, Mexico, is an excellent resource with its expanding medical services. The Douglas-Agua Prieta border crossing is simpler than most other crossings, from the historic City of Douglas in Cochise County, the most Southeastern community in Arizona. Arizona Peace Trail

History

In 2013, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD), conceived a plan to create a connector trail between Bullhead City in the north and Yuma in the south. The Arizona Sunriders ATV Club in Quartzsite, had been working with La Paz County since 2011 to create a loop OHV trail system in the Quartzsite area.

The Bouse Ghost Riders ATV Club was also working with La Paz County to develop OHV recreational opportunities in Bouse.



In early fall 2013, The Bouse Ghost Riders ATV Club saw the opportunity to combine the trail efforts by The BLM, AZGFD, La Paz County and local OHV clubs into a single-trail focused effort. By 2014, a team of 14 OHV clubs, under the leadership of J.C. Sanders, along with support from BLM, AZGFD, Yuma County, La Paz County and Mojave County, formed the **Arizona Peace Trail, Inc.** (AZPT) which gained non-profit status in July 2015.

Trail Formulation and Experience

The AZPT member clubs worked diligently, spending many hours of field research and coordination with numerous federal, state and local jurisdictions, and private property owners to ultimately define a 750-mile loop trail linking Mojave, La Paz and Yuma Counties. The trail has loops and segments of varying length and degrees of difficulty for multiple types of OHVs, including 4x4s, side-by-side utility vehicles, all-terrain vehicles and motorcycles. The trail is open to motorized and non-motorized users. Trail identification signs are being installed along the entire trail.

Trail users will experience dramatic landscape and ecosystem changes (elevation 170'-7070'), many varieties of cacti, red rock landscapes, winding sand washes and river bottoms, narrow canyons and ridge-line trails, historic sites, and fantastic scenic beauty. Expect to see Big Horn Sheep, coyote, raptors, owls, deer, desert tortoise and other wildlife.



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

See some of the most far reaching scenery in And fishing in them is more than spectacular! Arizona. Stand atop a 2,000 foot drop along the top of the Mogollon Rim, (there are several pronunciations, take your choice, moo-guhyohn or moggy-yawn), stretching 200 miles from Yavapai County to New Mexico. It is a true geological wonder hosting sedimentary, volcanic and metamorphic rock dating back to the Precambrian era.

Enjoy a leisure picnic or trek along the historic hiking and horseback riding trails.

Drive Forest Road 300 (Rim Road), a 43 mile scenic drive along the top of the rim with aweinspiring panoramic vistas along the entire route. While unpaved, it is well maintained for ease of travel. It accesses several pristine lakes, of which have the some of the clearest water in Arizona.



The easiest access is from Payson, (State Road 87), east on State Road 260, approximately 30 miles to the top of the rim. At the top, turn left to enjoy the spectacular views. The scenic Rim Road starts here, continuing west to State Road 87, north of Payson.

From early days in Arizona's territorial history, Yuma was considered to be the gateway to California. A settlement was built along with a bridge over the Colorado River and history was made.

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
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

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Grand Canyon's Timeless Allure


After his 1903 visit to the Grand Canyon, President Theodore Roosevelt remarked, "The Grand Canyon fills me with awe. It is beyond comparison - beyond description; absolutely unparalleled throughout the wide world... Let this great wonder of the nature remain as it now is. Do nothing to mar its grandeur, sublimity and loveliness. You cannot improve upon it. But what you can do is to keep it for your children, your children's children, and all who come after you, as the one great sight which every American should see."

He was of course not the first to see and be thrilled by this great treasure, but despite efforts by legislative advocates since 1882, it was not until 1919 that President Woodrow Wilson signed the Grand Canyon National Park Act into law.

Recognized as one of the seven natural wonders of the world, the Grand Canyon is 277 miles long, from 4,000 to 6,000 feet deep and 18 miles across at the widest point. The Colorado River's waters and the winds of millions of years have carved this majestic gorge out of layers of sedimentary rock. Geologists have dated the rocks at the top of the canyon at 250 million and at the bottom floor at just over 2 billion years old.

You can get to the South Rim by road or railroad, from the Grand Canyon Railway's station in Williams, AZ. Once there, you can spend a day exploring and admiring the views, or spend several days on guided or self-guided hikes to the Canyon floor. Hiking is not for the out-of-shape, so be prepared if you're interested in trying that.

The North Rim is a little more challenging to get to, but its rugged vistas and lack of tourist attractions makes this side of the Canyon worth the effort. It's open daily from May 15th through mid-October, with lodging and dining options for an overnight stay. From October 15-November 27, you can get in during the daytime, until snow closes Highway 67 for the winter. It's probably a good idea to call ahead to find out if the roads are clear for travel.
